ROLL NUMBERS SET TO EXPAND

After a lot of prayer that many of you have put in we are thrilled to be able to announce the Ministry of Education has approved the school's request to expand from 120 students to 150 students and to increase our non-preference roll from nine students to 15, or 10% of our total roll.



This is set to increase from the beginning of Term 2 on the condition the school is able to have a new classroom in place that meets Ministry of Education and local Council criteria. The great news on this front is that Peria Christian Education (PCE), the representative owners of the school, have been working on this for some time. Rather than build they have found some very suitable classrooms that can be brought in quickly and modified slightly at a fraction of the new build cost. However, there may be some competition for this so we need to band together in prayer for the necessary resource and building consents to go through, and for these buildings to be secured.

We currently have a small waiting list so this is welcome news. This is indeed a very exciting development for the school and we are grateful for the work God has been doing to make this happen. Big thanks also goes to Warren Storey and his team for removing an old tree stump in the last holidays that was in the way of where this development will go.

From the Desk of the Tumuaki

It has been a great start to the new school year and we thank you all for your willing involvement so far, especially for attending the family picnic and O' Night several weeks ago. The term is shaping up to be an exciting one.

Since the start of the term we want to welcome the Buys family who have joined our school family. Some of you met them at the family picnic. Isibel Buys has joined us at Year 7 and we are thrilled to have the family join our school family.

Looking at History

This term one of our key areas of learning is in New Zealand history. We label this 'Our Heritage' and it forms part of our two year cycle of teaching in the first term of each year under our 'Kid on the Rock' banner. In the first year of the cycle we explore who we are in our family identity, our school, our house teams and the world around us, then go on to develop critical thinking skills that we will use throughout the year. In the second year of the cycle, (this year), we explore a little bit of this and look at the heritage we are part of.

17 years ago I read some research that claimed that New Zealanders knew very little about their own history. As a result we developed a programme to explore our history at different age levels. This has since developed so that Matamata history is explored in our two junior classes, Waikato history in our two middle-senior classes and early New Zealand history at Years 7 and 8. This is the context that we use around the recently launched Aotearoa New Zealand Histories Curriculum.

Our history is part of who we are and contributes to what shapes our future as individuals and a collective nation. It defines much of our attitudes, the way we look at things and the issues we face that need to be dealt with. Much of our history has been shaped by Christianity as a result of missionaries that came. Their work helped progress our nation. At times this work was sometimes abused and sometimes mistakes were made too. When this happened there were sometimes disastrous side effects, but more often than not the missionaries message of love and grace changed the course of our nation, particularly through the peace movements that brought an end to the inter-tribal wars that decimated tribes in the mid 1800's.

History has become politicised over the last years. Special interest groups have been pushing their agendas for a number of years to try and right the wrongs of the past for indigenous people groups. This is called critical theory and looks at correcting injustices by swinging the pendulum of action to the opposite extreme to help make up for any past wrongs caused by colonisation. Where colonisation favoured and benefitted the colonists, a critical theory approach tries to make up for wrongs of the past by deliberately favouring affected indigenous cultures through any social and equity actions. This is meant to address equity between people groups. This approach is commonly being subscribed to by governments and agencies both here and overseas.

There are many injustices in our history but I want to suggest a critical theory approach is no answer to addressing these. These same groups pushing for such an approach will also tell us that the work of missionaries in the past have largely caused the injustices, but a true investigation of this would reveal that this is misguided thinking.

While mistakes were made most missionaries worked with the best of intentions. Māori leaders of the day also knew that changes were needed and many, especially around the Matamata area, embraced the messages the missionaries brought and wanted to seek a better way.

Te Waharoa was a local Māori chief for Ngati Hauā. He was a fierce and feared warrior but he was one who embraced the presence of the missionaries and invited them unto his land. He sent his son Wiremu Tamihana to be schooled and trained by the missionaries.

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By the time Tamihana got to lead for himself he had God in his heart and went about changing his people with God at the centre. He changed the way many of his people lived, acted and responded to others. He brought about a time of prosperity and peace before events beyond his realm dictated change he couldn't control.

Tamihana also helped lead the peace movement and was the architect of the Kingitanga movement which sought unity between tribes and Māori. This rich heritage was established in and around Matamata.

Today when you speak to leadership in Ngati Hauā they still seek a desire for their people to be in relationship with Christ and they seek a future that leaves behind the injustices of the past.

While critical theory is not the answer to correct injustices, an approach involving forgiveness, redemption and a determination to work together for the good of all people will be a key way forward. For this to work effectively it can only happen through relationship with God. The great news is that many are open to this.

We have much to learn from history, the good bits and the bad. History has created what we have today and the issues that have to be solved tomorrow. This is not something to fear but is something we can look to do through a different approach, one involving the biblical concept of shalom and all it has to bring. I look forward to sharing more about this with you.




STAGE 2: EXPANDING TO YEARS 9 AND 10

A lot of parents have been asking if we have been planning toward expanding into Years 9 and 10. Our PCE Board has been actively working on this and been having conversations with the Ministry of Education. We have had two applications in with the Ministry; one to expand our existing Year 1—8 roll to 150 students, and the other to integrate in Years 9 and 10 and expand the roll further to 175 students to accommodate this. As you saw on the front page we are nearly there on the first stage and we are now working to try to achieve this second stage with the Ministry. 
The cost of swimming and the bus trips are being covered by the school for all students as part of the government's sponsorship programme.

THIS YEAR'S TEACHER ONLY DAYS

This year the government has made changes to the English and Mathematics Curriculums. Along with this is a change in the way these subjects are taught to 'structured literacy' and 'structured



Mathematics'. Some of this remains the same for us as both BSLA, the Reading programme taught here in Years 1—3, and Writer's Toolbox, our Year 1—8 Writing programme, already fall under this banner. In Term 2, as it is introduced and rolled out across the country, BSLA will be introduced at Years 4—8 too.

What is new for us now is the Mathematics programme that we have introduced. This year each school was offered a choice of four programmes which the government has agreed to fund over the next two years. We have chosen the Oxford learning platform which you will see your children using now.

Along with the new curriculums are professional learning opportunities for every teacher. Some of this will be done through teacher release days while two of these days will be done through **two teacher only days** where our teachers will combine with three other Christian schools for Ministry of Education training. The first of these teacher only days is this term on **Friday the 21st of March**. The second will be on **Friday the 9th of May. School will be closed on these two days.** We apologise for any inconvenience and thank you for your support with this.

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."


