

#### ENCOUNTERING THE ENCOUNTER TEAM

Recently the Senior school had the privilege of hosting for the day a small group of Chinese students from the Encounter Team. Five 9—13 year olds and their teachers spent a day being part of our Year 5—8 classes seeing how school happens in New Zealand. In the afternoon the Chinese teachers ran the Art programme for our Year 5–6 students sharing some pretty cool Chinese origami style activities.

The Encounter Team are a Christian based organisation that take Chinese students out to experience different countries. Their students are not usually Christians themselves but the team tries to mix them with Christians in the countries they visit so they can begin to experience God wherever they go. For us then it is an honour to be able to host these students and be ambassadors for God to them, as well as begin to learn a little about China and what life looks like for them in their country.

With political tensions rising in the world it has now become a lot more difficult for Chinese students to leave and visit many western countries. In fact, more students were meant to be coming on this trip but had their exit visas turned down only hours before leaving. In spite of this the Encounter Team hope to bring more students to visit here and to visit us early next year. Please pray for them.



## From the Desk of the Tumuaki

As we move up to the halfway mark in the term we prepare for this year's Sports Camp out at Totara Springs. This is an exciting event that will see our Senior students pair up with those from Hamilton SDA to form a team that will take on seven other teams from around the central North Island. They will be challenged across some 40 different sports codes across the week as they battle it out to be the champions in each code. Spectators are welcome throughout the week so if you have children going out please feel free to go and watch and support.

This term our core value being developed is perseverance. This is something you can focus on alongside us at home too. Kiwi kids are often not known for their ability to stick at and persevere through something and that's something we're trying to change. When we're learning something new, to struggle a bit is good as that's when your brain is stretching and trying to make new connections. Don't be afraid of this, while it's certainly uncomfortable it tends to be when your biggest gains are made. When things are easy it doesn't take a lot of thinking and you go through more automatic motions. However, seriously having to push and think through something causes great growth. When you see your child struggling support them, encourage them, but unless it is totally beyond them altogether, don't do it for them. Let them learn and grow through it even if you need to provide a bit of support on the side.

Some call this GRIT. Please don't rob your child of the opportunities to develop this. It is so very fulfilling when achievement happens.

I like telling stories to help inspire people and get my point across so I'm going to retell some of my favourite stories I like to share over the next weeks. This week it's about an incredible Englishman by the name of William Wilberforce and what he persevered

through to abolish slavery in the British Empire...

William Wilberforce was born a privileged man in 1859. He came from a wealthy family and was set up well financially when his father died when he was aged only nine. William was not a hard worker but had excellent people skills. He loved partying and was popular. He decided not to pursue the family business and went into politics. He won an important seat and was famous for his stunning speeches. However it was not until he went on a trip taking his mother and sister at age 25 that William became a Christian and realised he had been squandering his life. He became determined to change that and be a man of real purpose.

Wilberforce quickly became a man of integrity and principle and it was during this time that he was presented with the issue of the slave trade. People were being stolen from Northern Africa and were being shipped to different parts of the British Empire and forced into slavery to help British trade. Often over half of a shipment of slaves would die during the journey as a result of the appalling conditions and rampant disease on the ships. Wilberforce decided to tackle the issue of slave trade first rather than banning slavery outright as he thought this would be easier.

The anti-slavery campaign ended up consuming the rest of his life. It took 19 years of fighting people in parliament, failing in the passing of different bills and petitions, fighting the people who really stood to benefit from slavery and fighting his own ailing health before he finally made some progress in 1804. The movie 'Amazing Grace' chronicles much of this journey and the events such as the French Revolution which effectively sidelined the antislavery campaigns. Yet though often very despondent, William Wilberforce knew that this fight was a part of his life's mission

before God. He knew he had to persevere because he had the best chance of anyone at being successful with this.

That was just the start however. The abolition of slavery through the colonies continued to take furious campaigning. As his health weakened he had to get others to help lead the cause. Finally in 1833 after 48 years of fighting, Parliament passed the bill to abolish slavery throughout the British Empire. Three days later William Wilberforce died aged 74.

> While Wilberforce did many other great things in his days to feed the poor, help pay the debts of those who could not pay for them themselves, and improve people's views on good Christian behaviour, the anti-slavery campaign was what stood out as his legacy. He fought to abolish slavery because this was something he believed stood between man and God. In 1831 he said to the Anti-Slavery Society, "Our motto must continue to be perseverance. And I ultimately trust the Almighty will crown our efforts with success."

So here lived a man who persevered for right

and for a legacy that makes him stand out as one of God's great men. May this help challenge each of us as well so that we persevere to do the right thing at the right time for the right reason.

#### **NEW FRUIT TREES**

We are thrilled to have had 17 new fruit trees donated to the school by our local Lions Club in the last few weeks. These trees fit in with our vision for developing our Permaculture programme in the school.



We have been given peach, plum, apricot, nectarine, apple and pear trees to plant. Space has been made for them around the perimeter of the school and we will be planting them soon.

We have borrowed a post hole borer to dig holes to plant them and we are very grateful to one of our parents, Nic Muir from Total Pro Landscapes, for being willing to prepare holes for planting for us.

Our students will be planting these trees over the next few weeks.



#### **CARPARK SAFETY**

Recently we had a close call in the school carpark when a young child walked along behind parked vehicles as a parent began to



reverse out. Fortunately the driver saw them in time but it did leave a number of people a little rattled.

Where possible, can we please encourage you to park on the footpath side of the carpark and instruct your children to walk up or down the footpath rather than in the carpark itself. If not possible please try to cross your children over with you. Remember research says that children do not become competent at judging traffic or vehicle speed until as late as age 14! And of course please continue to be vigilant yourself in the carpark.

#### AG, PET AND FLOWER DAY

This year's Ag, Pet and Flower Day is set for Tuesday the 15th



of October. This may sound like a long way off but really isn't.

Ag Day is available for those students who wish to compete and they can do so with a lamb, calf or goat. More details about this can be found on page 5.



Pet Day is available for any student not participating in Ag Day. If you have a loved pet at home and your child would like to bring them along for the morning they can enter

them in the competition. We invite one of our local vets in to come and judge our animals. They look at how well their pet is looked after, the relationship your child has with them (if appropriate), how involved they are in their care and what they know about their pet. They need



to fill out a pet diary over a four week period in the lead up to the day. These diaries are available from the school office and will need to be started by Monday the 16th of September at the latest.

This year we bring back Flower Day again. This is now a biannual event and is a chance for students to bring out

their creative skills. Again, this is for all students not involved in Ag Day. Because the day is the second day back after the school holidays please look out for flowers and foliage they can bring around the end of the school holidays. More details will come home about

At Assembly last week we were thrilled to have Paige from World Vision come to present our school





Well done to everyone who has been a part of these challenges!







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**COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES** 

#### COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

#### To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says." – Matthew 18:15-16

#### In response to complaints -

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry." – James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you." – Ephesians 4:32

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.

If a complaint is about a School Board issue or matter please use their complaints procedures chart (available from school).
