From the Desk of the Tumuaki

We are in the final two weeks of term and have a busy few weeks ahead with the completion of our Olympirua events, our annual Open Day, and the terms celebrations including the Olympirua medal ceremony. We hope you can be with us for some of these events and help us promote the Open Day this Wednesday.

This term our core value being developed is perseverance. This is something you can focus on alongside us at home too. Kiwi kids are often not known for their ability to stick at and persevere through something and that's something we're trying to change. When we're learning something new, to struggle a bit is good as that's when your brain is stretching and trying to make new connections. Don't be afraid of this, while it's certainly uncomfortable it tends to be when your biggest gains are made. When things are easy it doesn't take a lot of thinking and you go through more automatic motions. However, seriously having to push and think through something causes great growth. When you see your child struggling support them, encourage them, but unless it is totally beyond them altogether, don't do it for them. Let them learn and grow through it even if you need to provide a bit of support on the side. Some call this GRIT. Please don't rob your child of the opportunities to develop this. It is so very fulfilling when achievement happens.

I like telling stories to help inspire people and get my point across so I'm retelling some of my favourite perseverance

stories here this term. Here's my last story for the term and, with the American elections coming up next term, this one is about one of America's most famous people who just never gave up:

In 1831 this man failed in a business venture he had tried hard at. In 1832 he stood for the American state legislature but was defeated. In 1833 he failed at yet another business venture. In 1835 his heart was shattered when his fiancé died and this helped lead to his own nervous breakdown in 1836. In 1843 he stood

for Congress but was defeated but had another go in 1848 only to be defeated again. In 1855 he stood for Senate but lost and in 1856 stood for the candidacy of Vice President and lost that too. In 1859 he tried again for Senate but to no avail. Yet finally in 1860 Abraham Lincoln became the 16th President of the United States!

An amazing story of perseverance isn't it? Since his time as

president Abraham Lincoln has consistently been voted as one of the three most influential presidents of all time too. I hope this helps inspire you today to persevere at something you believe passionately in and in growing your walk with God.

Elgregoe is a Christian himself and goes to lengths to explain to our students that his work is not magic but works on illusions. He also has a clear anti-bullying message he peddles.


The show will be at **1:30PM on Thursday** the **26th of September** here at school. The school has paid for this and whānau are welcome to come along and bring pre-schoolers.



MATAMATA CHRISTIAN SCHOOL'S FLOWER DAY 2024

Our bi-annual Flower Day event is on this year and runs alongside Ag and Pet Day this coming **Tuesday the 15th of October**. This is a chance for the artistic side of each student to come out and shine. There are a number of categories students can enter into and each should enter into two categories (note those involved with Ag Day will not have time to take part in Flower Day).

The Rules (because we have to have these in fairness to all)

- Students should bring only raw materials to school. Vegetables must not be pre-cut and flower arrangements cannot be prepared at home beforehand.
- Please no practising or preparing at home as this invites too much parent or whānau input. The only exception to this is with the miniature gardens where suggestions can be made at home and students can have a trial run, but parents and whānau cannot help students prepare or practise please.

The Categories

Year Levels Category

- **1 3 Sand Saucer.** You need to bring a saucer with your name marked underneath. You can use sand (available at school) or Vaseline. Have plenty of small flowers and petals of all sizes. You should be trying to cover any sand if it is used.
- **1 8 Arrangement in an Unusual Container.** Bring something cool—a container, old teapot, shoe etc. You will need an arrangement of blooms.
- 1 8 Miniature Garden to be made in a roasting dish or similar. Gardens can be practised at home, disassembled and reassembled at school. The pan should be no bigger than 40cm please. Gardens are to be made from natural materials (no artificial flowers please). Cars, plastic animals and Lego props are allowed. Mirrors or foil can also be used for streams or a pond effect.



LEARNING JOURNAL NIGHT


Next week on **Wednesday the 25th of September** family members are invited to your children's Learning Journal night. At the end of each of Terms 1 - 3 students bring parents and family in to share about



their learning and work from the preceding term. This is a student led interview where your child does most of the talking. Research shows that when students can understand and talk about their learning they will engage in and take more responsibility for their own development. Once this happens learning becomes deeper and more powerful. We really want to encourage you to take the time to be involved in this as your involvement is a key factor in your child's learning success helping demonstrate to them what importance you place on their learning.

Classrooms are open between 3:15PM and 7PM. You do not need to make an appointment, just come along anytime between these times. This is not a parent - teacher interview but teachers will be there to help with explanations as necessary.

As always, if you would like to discuss any aspect of your child's learning further, please make a time with the teacher. This applies all year round as we want parents to feel able to come in any time of the year and as often as is necessary.



Brooke was born in Whangarei in 1992. It was on the grass at Kensington Park in Whangarei that three-year-old Brooke first picked up a hockey stick. Hockey was in the Neal family, older brother Shay played, Brooke's father coached many of her teams and Brooke's mother was either manager or parent help at tournaments.

Brooke played in.

Brooke made her first representative team aged ten. She attended Whangarei Girls' High School and was part of a team containing future Black Sticks Charlotte and Samantha Harrison, Alana Millington, and Jasmine McQuinn. This team won the Federation Oup, the top secondary school competition in New Zealand.

In 2012 Brooke travelled to India to play for the New Zealand Under 21 team in a four nations tournament where they came second to Germany. 2018 was to be a big year in Brooke's career. In July she played for the Under 21s in the Junior World Cup held in Germany, and then later that year in October, Brooke made her senior Black Sticks debut against Australia.

As a member of the Black Sticks, Brooke was one of New Zealand's most effective defenders. A tall, skiful and difficult player for opposition attackers to have to deal with, Brooke's strengths were her aglifty, speed and her long reach. Brooke also offered a good scoring option

While her hockey career was flourishing. Brooke also knew that it was important to get academic qualifications she was awarded the Walksto University Sir Edmund Hilary Scholarship, which sent her off to Hamilton in 2011 to study for a Bachelor of Communications degree. Upon graduating Brooke initially worked for a marketing company.

It wasn't all plain sailing during her hockey career, with a knee injury in 2013. Recovery was a crucial part in managing her career through this injury. The guideline that Brooke gives is that for every hour of training there was at least 30 minutes of stretching, foam rolling or trigger point massage. Brooke says her injury made her look seriously at her priorities and helped her develop resilience and discipline.

An important figure throughout Brooke's hockey career was her brother Shay, who was also in Rio as part of the New Zealand Men's Hockey team. Brooke credits Shay with having a massive impact on her career. She says whe's always looked to him for advice, and they always shared information on the best ways to do things in their aport, and in everyday life as well. On a lighter note, Brooke reckons the reason she became a defender was because when they were little, Shay would dreas her up in goalle gear and a helmet and whack tennis balls at her!

At the 2016 Rio Olympics the Women's Black Sticks held high hopes for their first ever medal after beating archrivals Australis in the quarterfinals 4-2. Unfortunately, they were beaten by a fired-up Great Britain in the semis and eventually finished fourth. Brooke says the Rio Games were life changing. She found it so inspiring to be amongst the world's beat athletes.

Brooke retired from International Hockey in 2020 after playing 178 games for the Black Sticks. Her eight-year international career included competing at the 2016 Olympic Games where her team placed fourth and winning Gold at the Commonwealth Games in 2018, the first time in history this had been schieved. Brooke is also a mindset and wellbeing coach, launching All About Balance in 2016. She knows that mental health is more important than ever, but 'high performance' and 'wellbeing' continue to be two separate conversations. Brooke's mission is to inspire women in sport and business to put well-being at the centre of everything that they do, and as a result, be able to perform consistently at a high level. She runs workshops, online programmes and yoga sessions as a registered teacher. Brooke was made an Olympic Ambassador after the 2018 Rio Olympics.

SUMMER UNIFORM

From the start of next term it is time to change over to summer uniform. In effect this simply means going from shoes to black school sandals and adding the school sunhat.

Sandals can cause a little bit of angst. In the past we have only accepted Roman sandals but we recognise the quality of these can be quite mixed now and they are not particularly comfortable. We have decided to accept black sandals with wide straps and open toes to help. It is important however not to choose fashion styled ones as this contradicts the purpose of uniforms which is to place everyone in the same presentation bracket.







We recognise that Year 8 students who are leaving for College at the end of the year may need to have different footwear for next year. If you are having to replace their footwear from last summer they may either carry on wearing their winter shoes and socks or families may buy their 2025 summer footwear and wear these. This only applies for Year 8 students and only if their sandals from last season no longer fit please.

Sunhats are part of our health and safety protocol and need to be worn as often as possible outside to help protect your children from the dangers of the New Zealand sun. We also recommend you apply sunscreen to your child at the start of the school day for added protection. COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

- Matthew 18:15-16

In response to complaints -

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."

— James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you."

— Ephesians 4:32

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.

If a complaint is about a School Board issue or matter please use their complaints procedures chart (available from school).
