SPORTING PROWESS AT SPORTS CAMP

From the Desk of the Tumuaki

It has been a busy few weeks here at school, especially with Sports Camp on. There are a number of events still to come, particularly this week. To make these happen we really need your help please with transport, crucially with the Cross Country as we have nearly 120 children to move for this. If you can help and want to be part of the spectating please let us know by filling in the reply slips within this newsletter. If you are keen to run we usually have a parent race for those who want to have a go too!

This term our core value being developed is perseverance. This is something you can focus on alongside us at home too. Kiwi kids are often not known for their ability to stick at and persevere through something and that's something we're trying to change. When we're learning something new, to struggle a bit is good as that's when your brain is stretching and trying to make new connections. Don't be afraid of this, while it's certainly uncomfortable it tends to be when your biggest gains are made. When things are easy it doesn't take a lot of thinking and you go through more automatic motions. However, seriously having to push and think through something causes great growth. When you see your child struggling support them, encourage them, but unless it is totally beyond them altogether, don't do it for them. Let them learn and grow through it even if you need to provide a bit of support on the side. Some call this GRIT. Please don't rob your child of the opportunities to develop this. It is so very fulfilling when achievement happens.

I like telling stories to help inspire people and get my point across so I'm retelling some of my favourite perseverance stories here. Today's story comes from one of the most famous people in history:

In June of 1955, Sir Winston Churchill, who was near the end of his life, was asked to give a commencement address at a British university. At this time he was physically infirm; he had to be helped to the podium. He held on to the podium for what seemed an endless amount of time.

He stood with his head bowed down but finally looked up. Then the voice that years before had called Britain back from the brink of destruction sounded publicly for the last time in history: "Never, never, never give up." With that, Churchill turned and went back to his seat.

I read somewhere that there was silence, and then, as if one person, the whole audience

rose to applaud him. They rose to applaud him because here was a man whose life and words were together. During the darkest days of World War II when country after country was being swallowed by the Nazis, when German planes were bombing English cities into piles of rubble, when the threat of invasion seemed imminent, when even the hardiest of souls was giving up hope, Winston Churchill never lost hope and never gave up. He called his country to their knees in prayer. It was a turning point. Even throughout his political career, Churchill had known setbacks. Three times, his career apparently over, he was sent off to oblivion. Three times he came back to lead his country. Here was a man who never gave up.

service, it is never time to slacken our efforts. In the Lord's service, we must never come to the point of giving up. Paul had this in mind when he wrote Galatians 6:9: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up".

This has been my own theme verse in the past. Whenever we are tempted to do less than our best, or perhaps to quit completely, we ought to remember this verse and the truths that it contains.



COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says." – Matthew 18:15-16

In response to complaints -

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry." – James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you." – Ephesians 4:32

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.

If a complaint is about a School Board issue or matter please use their complaints procedures chart (available from school).
